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Feature Article – CASSE to Organize a Forum on Population and Economic Growth

At CASSE, we are honored to be working with the Population Media Center, the Wallace Global Fund, and Harvard University to develop and organize a forum on population growth, economic growth, and their collective role in societal prosperity. This project represents a big opportunity for CASSE on two fronts: (1) as a way to carry out the educational part of our mission by convening experts and developing a unified message about the effects of population growth and economic growth; and (2) as a way to raise CASSE's profile among scholars and funding networks.

Although dates have not been finalized, plans for the forum are progressing. Twenty to thirty of the top minds in the fields of demography, ecological economics, sustainable development, and neoclassical economics, will be invited to clarify the interaction

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CASSE MISSION

The mission of CASSE is to advocate a sustainable economy by:

- educating citizens, organizations, and policy makers on the conflict between economic growth and (1) environmental protection, (2) ecological and economic sustainability, and (3) national security and international stability;
- promoting a steady state economy of stable or mildly fluctuating size as an alternative to economic growth; and
- studying the means to establish a steady state economy.

In July CASSE participated in a symposium on economic growth at the annual meeting of the Society for Conservation Biology in Chattanooga, Tennessee. The well-attended symposium consisted of six presentations and sparked a lively discussion about the effects of economic growth on biodiversity conservation. A local news crew interviewed CASSE staff about ecological economics and the environmental impacts of a new auto factory. The symposium also spurred interest in a book on the effects of economic growth.

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between growth and economic wellbeing. We hope to enhance the dialogue among experts on population, economic growth, and optimal scale, and help coordinate the efforts of organizations working on sustainability issues.

The first part of the three-part forum will focus on the effects of lowering birthrates on economic scale, and the costs and benefits of increasing scale in nations with varying levels of wealth and income. These are thought-provoking issues with sweeping implications. In a short amount of time, forum participants will hypothesize how population size, age distribution, and other demographic factors affect economic scale, and how scale affects economic wellbeing.

The second part of the forum will develop scenarios on changes in population size and economic scale in both poor and wealthy nations. In exploring such scenarios, experts will develop arguments to debunk the "birth dearth" – the notion that stabilized populations are harmful to the economy and social wellbeing. The scenarios will also help participants describe sustainable economic scale and paths for maximizing societal prosperity.

The third and final part of the forum will focus on communicating a unified message about optimal scale and the effects of continuing growth on both population and economic output. Forum participants will craft a set of agreed-upon principles of population growth, economic scale, and wellbeing in both poor and wealthy nations. The participants will also brainstorm the best means and audiences for spreading the unified message.

CASSE will be involved in all phases of organizing and coordinating the forum – from logistics to facilitation to development of both preparatory and concluding materials. CASSE will undertake much work to design and direct the forum, but the partners will provide extensive experience and expertise. The Population Media Center <www.populationmedia.org> has years of experience in the politically sensitive realm of population issues. The organization strives to improve the health and wellbeing of people around the world through the use of entertainment-education strategies, like serialized dramas on radio and television, in which characters evolve into role models for the audience.

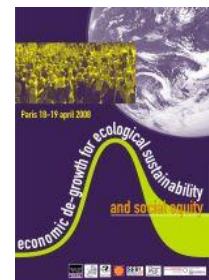

POLICY CORNER

In this space, CASSE provides a brief introduction to a policy idea that supports a sustainable economy. A more in-depth resource is also listed for further study.

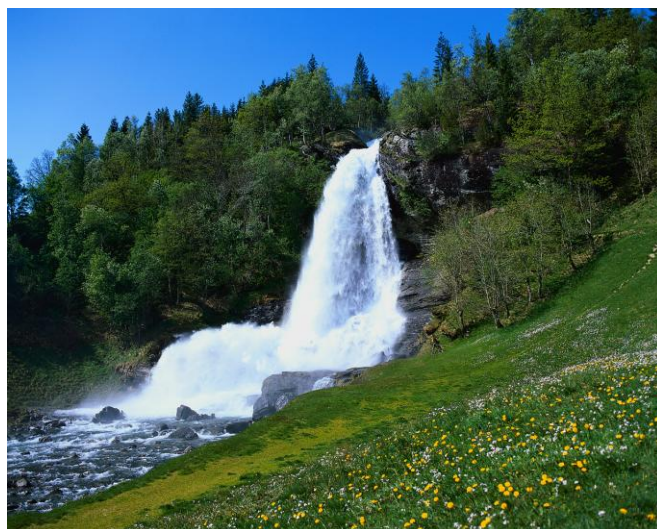
It is becoming common knowledge that GDP (gross domestic product) is not a good measure of societal wellbeing. Among GDP's most glaring shortcomings are its inclusion of defensive expenditures (e.g., environmental clean-up and prison construction) and liquidation of natural resources as current income. If GDP doesn't do the job of indicating wellbeing, what are some national-scale measures that provide a clearer picture of wellbeing and sustainability? Ecological footprint, genuine progress indicator, environmentally sustainable national income, index of sustainable economic welfare, human development index, human appropriation of net primary production, happy planet index, and environmentally weighted material consumption are a few possibilities.

FUNDING UPDATE

In this space, CASSE reports on organizational finances and efforts to raise additional funding.

The executive director is the only paid position on the CASSE staff, and other operating expenses are minimized. Small grants from foundations have provided some of the money needed, but the majority comes from generous citizens who are concerned about the sustainability of our economic systems. The grant from the Wallace Global Fund (see feature article), a grant from the Yang Foundation, and donations from individuals have provided CASSE with enough cash in reserves to supply about 6 months of operating costs. ❖
