It's Not Easy Being CASSE, But... By Brian Czech, CASSE President, Volunteer, and Donor

As global population ticks toward 7.2 billion and GDP bloats beyond \$50 trillion, CASSE remains the only organization in the world whose raison d'être is advancing the steady state economy. It's hard to blame other organizations. It's not easy being CASSE.

Big foundations tend to be tied to Wall Street and focused on growing the economy!

It's also not easy to ask individuals for money. Believe me, even the sentence you're reading, as benign as it is, was long in coming to the keyboard. How do I ask you to pitch in and help us out; we the lone organization devoted explicitly to advancing the steady state economy? Well, I guess I just did, and at least I can encourage youwith a shining example of steady state philanthropy from 2013.

Mission

The mission of CASSE is to advance the steady state economy, with stabilized population and consumption, as a policy goal with widespread public support.

We pursue this mission by:

- educating citizens on the conflict between economic growth and environmental protection, economic sustainability, national security, and international stability;
- promoting a steady state economy as a desirable alternative to economic growth; and
- studying the means to establish a steady state economy.

Now I want to thank every CASSE donor from 2013 – each donation is greatly appreciated – but I'm sure all will agree that it is also appropriate to give a special

thank-you to Peter Seidel. Peter had a vision for steady statesmanship and provided the funding to pursue it.

What vision was that? Like many of us, Peter was regularly disappointed at the prominence of pro-growth coverage in the mainstream media. It's a tall order to change the media per se, but in the age of the internet it's easy to *respond*, at least, in a way that people notice. In the blogosphere, for example, many readers pay more attention to the comments than the article itself.

So in June, 2013, with Peter's determination and generosity, we hired CASSE's first Projects Director, Rentz Hilyer. By now, among his other activities, Rentz has entered into the blogosphere hundreds of times, advancing the steady state economy with each new entry.

Rentz comes to CASSE from the Master of Natural Resources program at Virginia Tech, where he studied steady state economics among other things. Rentz's background was in construction project management. Now as CASSE Projects Director, Rentz is building something quite different, but many of the same skills are applicable: communication, coordination, and encouragement to name a few.

If you're a CASSE volunteer, you've probably heard from Rentz as he endeavors to organize and mobilize our volunteer network. Please respond! If you signed up to be a CASSE volunteer, there was a reason; now's the time to pursue it. And if you're not a CASSE volunteer, <u>now's the time to become one</u>.

Imagine if even half of our volunteers chimed in with Rentz in the blogosphere. By now we'd have not just hundreds, not just thousands, but tens of thousands of comments introducing the steady state economy to readers, many of whom are starving for a solution to the problems caused by the growing, threatening ecological footprint; that is, caused by economic growth. This is how society and the polity start to change: by talking about it.

So let's take advantage of the leverage provided by Peter Seidel. Let's chime in to change the way society thinks about economic growth. The blogosphere is only one venue. Rentz will be coordinating action on many other fronts.

Meanwhile, with the decision of past Administrative Director, Mike Sandler, to move into the private sector in July, Rentz had to double down and handle basic administrative tasks as well as project activities. Until we found Jacquelyn Kirkland, that is.

Jacqi brings outstanding skills from a top-notch program in the School of Public and Environmental Affairs at Indiana University. The Administrative Director is the glue that holds a small non-profit together, so we can use all those skills. Finances, membership, calendars, website maintenance, database management, conference arrangements, monitoring the CASSE inbox, and a great many other tasks fill Jacqi's days.

The newsletter you're reading? It doesn't appear out of nowhere. Someone has to gather the material, edit, design the web pages, and distribute to readers. That's Jacqi too.

And how did we find Jacqi? Actually it's more like she found us. She was a CASSE volunteer! Her proactivity caught our attention, and the rest was good timing and outstanding references.

Beyond this significant development in CASSE personnel, funding and management, I'll let the newsletter do the talking about other 2013 CASSE highlights. To close out the introduction, I only want to encourage CASSE supporters, members and signatories to look forward to 2014 – the 10th anniversary of CASSE. We're going to make a bigger splash, and we're just in the process of planning how to do so. Stay tuned.
