Chapter Highlights

The CASSE London chapter held a public meeting titled "Costing London's Growth" on October 7th, 2014. The context of the event was the current London administration's removal of 'ecological footprinting' from London wide plans; it has been over ten years since the issue has been publicly addressed. The event aimed to provide clarification of selected sustainability issues as they relate to London. To this end, a panel of five experts addressed footprinting, demographics, economics, civic action, and policy. Each speaker had 15 minutes to present, then the floor was opened for a question-and-answer session.
